

CEO's Report



Welcome to our Bendigo Kangan Institute (BKI) Quarter Three (Q3) report for the period 1 July to 30 September 2022. It's hard to believe that Quarter 3 has ended and we're one guarter away from the end of the year. In Quarter 3 we continued to deploy our North Star transformation program of work and moved closer to achievement of our 20>25 strategy execution. You can read about our progress in the full quarterly report, as well as a couple of highlights and acknowledgments in my CEO Report.

Victorian Training Awards

I'm so proud to confirm that BKI was awarded Large Training Provider of the Year for 2022 at the Victorian Training Awards in September. Two of our students also won awards - Desirae Kilduff for Koorie Student of the Year, and Franchesca Morale for Trainee of the Year. Congratulations to Desirae and Franchesca!

It's also the second year in a row that we were nominated as a finalist for the Inclusive Training Provider category - strong recognition of our ongoing efforts in this space. Congratulations also to our student Madison Giordano who was nominated in the Apprentice of the Year category.

What an absolute credit to our dedicated and committed team at BKI for our Large Training Provider of the Year award, and to our Board for their guidance and support. It's further acknowledgement of the great work everyone does to always ensure students are at the centre of everything we do. Despite the challenges of COVID-19 over the past year, we were able to adapt swiftly and go above and beyond to ensure our BKI and our students continued to thrive. Congratulations everyone.

Transforming BKI and our Student Experience continues with the official launch of Job Ready Plus (JR+)

On 1 August, the Student Journey Transformation Program (SJTP) team achieved a very important milestone with the JobReady Plus Course Set-up and Timetable functionality officially going live, and our staff commencing creation of courses in JR+; with complements Program and Course Catalogue publishing capabilities. This is an exciting achievement and a significant milestone in the program, and the deployment enabled 2023 Course Offerings and Timetables to be created in preparation for 2023 enrolments. The 2023 enrolment functionality was also deployed through September.

Farewell to Peter Harmsworth, Board Chair

We celebrated Peter Harmsworth AO as his time as Board Chair of the Institute came to an end on 31 August. Peter joined Bendigo Kangan Institute's Board as a Director in 2016 and became Chair of the Board in October 2017. He is a passionate advocate for the TAFE sector with a strong vision for vocational education and training. During his tenure Peter played an active role in the stewardship and oversight of our daily business especially through his contributions as Board Chair and as a member of the Finance, Risk and Audit Committee, the Education and Business Development Committee, the Governance and Culture Committee, and the VETASSESS Committee.

We also acknowledge Peter's passion for our Indigenous Education Centre and his work on its Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) launched in August 2021. The first of its kind for the TAFE sector, our Innovate RAP is a framework designed to make real progress towards reconciliation by ensuring that we take practical steps to build relationships, respect, and opportunities in a way that's accountable to the Institute and the Indigenous community.

Marg O'Rourke was appointed as interim Board Chair following Peter Harmsworth's departure.

Finally, I'm excited to move into our fourth quarter and look forward to working with the team and sharing more achievements and milestones in our next quarterly report.


Financial Report

The net result for Q3 2022 was deficit of (\$10.117) million.

This is predominantly due to the timing of grants, recognition of capital works revenue and project expenditure. We have seen a reduction of 19% in demand of new enrolment which has a direct impact on the second half of budgeted training revenue.

We continue to monitor our costs closely to budget and to invest in North Star initiatives to improve our operational efficiencies and our path to sustainability.





The proportion of KI Free TAFE enrolments is equal to Q3 2021.


Top 3 Free TAFE courses




Top 3 Free TAFE courses

BKI operating margin Indicates proportion of revenue left over after paying for variable and fixed costs, and available for investment. A higher number is a stronger result.




BKI employment costs as a % of training revenue Proxy for gross margin on main





Improving our offering

We provide skills and experience for young Victorians to meet the demands they will face in the workforce today and into the future.

Our hospitality, bakery, and cookery students are back on campus

From July, Baked Goods were back at our Broadmeadows campus during the term at their bakery window (Wednesday and Thursday). Students studying Certificate III in Bakery and Certificate III in Commercial Cookery were once again selling their delicious cakes, danishes, donuts, fresh bread, egg and bacon rolls, and a lot more.



The book-in sit-down lunch at Richard's Restaurant at Broadmeadows also opened for staff to enjoy a fine dining experience at great prices. Managed by our staff and hospitality students, Richard's is a training restaurant that showcases all the hospitality skills that our students learn when they study with us.

The training kitchen in Bendigo City also opened for staff and community for lunches - all prepared by our students with well-planned menus at very affordable prices.

DELWP Forest and Fire Operations Officer Traineeship Program extended

We announced in July that the Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning (DELWP) Forest and Fire Operations Officer Traineeship Program has been extended for a further 18 months, with an investment of \$1.3M. The additional funding will deliver two more groups of trainees for the Certificate III in Agriculture and Certificate III in Conservation and Ecosystem Management in 2022 and 2023.



This life-changing opportunity will be offered to 12 Victorian-based youth aged between 16 - 24 who come from disadvantaged and culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds including those of Aboriginal descent. Some of the trainees are refugees or asylum seekers and the program will give them an opportunity to connect with regional Australia and be supported while they study with us.



This fixed-term program will provide trainees with two (2) years of paid employment with DELWP as Forest and Fire Operations officers in regional Victoria while they study to complete a Certificate III in Conservation and Land Manager.

BKI designed, developed, and delivered the Certificate III in Conservation and Land Management training across three (3) intakes from 2018 - 2022. Since 2018, 12 trainees have participated in and completed the

Skills and Jobs Centre and Employment Centre moved to a new location

In July, the Skills and Jobs Centre and Employment Centre moved from Building A to Building C (in the library) at the Broadmeadows campus to better serve our students and community. The Skills & Jobs Centre is a 'one-stop-shop' offering independent advice and support to individuals by our qualified career advisors. The Centre offers free weekly employability workshops and assists individuals Looking for training, considering a career change and/or preparing for employment.



The Employment Centre provides assistance to students and recent graduates who are seeking employment. The Centre offers one-on-one support for job searching; job application preparation and interview techniques; assistance with developing employability skills and access to vacancies advertised through the Centre.

Our community partner BRITE visits Broadmeadows

On 10 August, we were thrilled to welcome community partner Rob Hannaford, CEO of BRITE to our Broadmeadows campus. Well known in the community, BRITE is a social enterprise and not for profit charity, and has been changing people's lives for over 40 years through meaningful jobs and support services. Over the years, our ongoing partnership with BRITE benefits students with disability, mainly in the horticulture and aged

care areas. We now look forward to advancing the partnership with BRITE as our new Broadmeadows Campus Revitalisation Program - Stage 1 takes off.

Carolyn Burr Head of Campus said It was a great opportunity to continue our conversations with BRITE and our shared vision for education, training and skills in the Northern region. Our bakery team also attended sharing their freshly baked cakes and muffins.



Advancing our horticulture program

In an industry first, Kangan Institute and Oasis Horticulture collaborated to deliver the Certificate III in Horticulture at Oasis's Devon Meadows site. This fantastic initiative was published in the Nursery and Garden Industry Victoria (NGIV) August Groundswell hard copy publication, distributed to over 4000 members across Victoria - amazing exposure for our Horticulture program.







Air Conditioning, Refrigeration & Building Services (ARBS) 2022 exhibition - on the road to upskill the air conditioning and refrigeration industry in regional Victoria

Australia's largest air conditioning and refrigeration trade exhibition - the Air Conditioning, Refrigeration & Building Services (ARBS) 2022 was held at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre from 16 to 18 August. At the exhibition, our Construction & Industrial team in conjunction with GoTAFE launched a unique training pod to take upskilling on the road for the regional air conditioning and refrigeration industry. The first trip for the training pod was to the exhibition in Melbourne.

This innovative fleet of mobile training pods were developed with GoTAFE to upskill the air-conditioning and refrigeration industry in regional Victoria. Bringing the training to the students, the mobile training pods deliver on-location training, and support tradespeople to get up to date with the latest work practices and become qualified to work with new environmentally friendly refrigerants. Led by Education Managers Jim Box and Tony Burmeister, the team showcased this new training opportunity and our engagement with industry. Feedback from exhibition attendees was very positive, with the training pod generating much interest and many enquiries from businesses.



Our students excel at the Regional WorldSkills competition

The Regional WorldSkills competition was also held at the ARBS expo, with two of our Bendigo TAFE Air-conditioning and Refrigeration students competing as part of 15 apprentices from four institutes. Participants were required to build a refrigeration coil which was judged on the quality of work and efficiency of output, as well as fault-finding in refrigeration equipment.

Joshua Butcher, 2nd year apprentice studying Certificate III finished in second place and Hayden Leech, 3rd year apprentice finished third - a fantastic outcome! Congratulations Joshua and Hayden and to their teachers who mentored and supported them to reach this milestone.

Teacher Steve Crapper, who was also one of the judges at WorldSkills reflected, "We're all very proud of both Josh and Hayden. It was such a great result, especially since it was Bendigo TAFE's first time competing in refrigeration WorldSkills."

The exhibition featured around 250 national, multi-national and international manufacturers, distributors and agents and attracted over 7.000 visitors.

With construction of Bendigo's new \$152.4 million regional court hub almost complete, the new facilities set to provide regional Victoria with even greater access to critical justice services. Students enjoyed the opportunity to get a sneak peek at what may be a possible future workplace for some of them.

The new Bendigo Law Court Development will service the Magistrates Court of Victoria, Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal as well as the County Court of Victoria, Federal Circuit Court, and Supreme Court of Victoria on a circuit basis. This court will be the first in Victoria to feature a full suite of specialist courts at one location, including a Koori Court, Children's Court, and courts for family violence, drug matters, mental health assessment, and referral.

We hosted the Manufacturing Manoeuvres fashion forum at Cremorne campus

Meet Mohammad Bhuyan - a former vet who is now an animal studies teacher

When veterinarian Mohammad Bhuyan migrated from Bangladesh to Melbourne in 2015, one of his biggest challenges was how to build a career he loved in his new country. Armed with an overseas qualification in veterinary science and seven years of experience as a registered veterinarian in Bangladesh, Mohammad's first steps were to pursue further study in Melbourne as a stepping-stone into employment.

That's when he enrolled in our Diploma of Laboratory Technology and Certificate III in Animal Studies, a move that enabled him to secure a role as a laboratory technician at our Broadmeadows campus.

"As a laboratory technician, I had the opportunity to work both in laboratory and animal studies environments. My main responsibilities were to prepare and demonstrate laboratory practical science classes and work with the teacher in animal studies practical classes," Mohammad shared.

After three years as a technician, Mohammad decided to apply his extensive knowledge and experience in a new direction - teaching. He also applied for the Victorian Government's TAFE teacher incentive program which provides skilled professionals in industry with an incentive payment to retrain as a TAFE teacher.

"My education and experience in working within the education sector gave me confidence and encouraged me to change my profession to become a TAFE teacher," he said. "After getting encouragement and support from my managers and supervisors, I started Certificate IV in Training and Assessment, which was an evening program, and applied for the TAFE Teacher Incentive Program. "Throughout the course, I received mentoring and support from the teaching department and after completing my training, I secured a full-time ongoing teaching position in Animal Studies and Laboratory Science." "I am very proud to be a part of BKI and I am enjoying working with the students of multicultural backgrounds," he said.

Mohammad is thriving in his new role as a teacher at our Broadmeadows campus and BKI is delighted to have supported and played a part in his journey to success.

Rather than these items ending up in landfill, Green Collect - a social enterprise organisation - collects and recycles or repurposes unwanted office furniture. Not only are they doing something great for the environment they also provide work opportunities for disadvantaged jobseekers.

Since last year the team has saved 412 furniture pieces (4,478kg) from Moonee Ponds from going to landfill and created 137 hours of work. They also saved 127 furniture pieces (or 2,794kg) from Essendon which created a further 81 hours of work for people facing significant barriers to employment. This is a great outcome for all as the saved assets will now benefit low-income households and community groups who have limited access to such resources in Melbourne's western suburbs.

Groundworks on campuses continue

Our Facilities team have been hard at work maintaining and improving our campuses. The team recently completed some ground works at Broadmeadows and Charleston Road, continuing to transform the campuses to provide a greater student and staff experience.

















Digitally enabling our operations

We will streamline and digitally enable our systems and processes to improve productivity and staff experience. We will maintain and strengthen our cyber security and system integrity across the organisation and support best practice learning and teaching practices through up-to-date technology solutions.

Our new websites are live!

We launched our new websites - Kangan Institute and Bendigo TAFE on 18 July. It's a huge step forward for how we support our students with easy to use, responsive and interactive sites, with a vibrant look and feel offering an improved customer experience. They are also much quicker to update. This has been a huge project with some great student and staff improvements - congratulations to everyone involved. Over the first couple of months, we've seen a steady increase of visitors and page views with some very promising data emerging:

- For the two (2) months since launch, we have seen 67,879 unique visitors to the sites; spending an average of
- On average, 4% of people who come to visit the websites submit an application (which is over 3,000 in the last 2 months). We exceeded our 2021 August application number by 98 applications
- Our three (3) most popular portfolio pages have been Trades & Industrial, Accounting & Management, and Health & Community.

We launched our Teams soft phone telephone system

From 8 August we moved to a soft phone system for staff, accessed through MS Teams - using the MS Teams dial pad to make or receive calls from within or external to BKI. Old handsets will be collected and sent for recycling.

HEAT is more than just your ticket for ICT support

In early August, we announced that our HEAT portal used to log all our ICT support tasks will also become the one-stop shop to take requests for support from the Student Administration team. This change replaces the email-based service requests to ensure staff can keep track of issues using our enterprise ticketing system. HEAT is on the home page of KanBe Hub. HEAT is also being used to help log tickets for support issues for JR+ as we implement our Student Journey Transformation Program. Using HEAT shows our continuing systems maturity, and the value of using the one ticketing system across BKI.

SharePoint data migration pilot

We are starting to migrate our files from our existing network drives to SharePoint. This will happen in a phased roll out following successful pilots with ICT and the Food and Fibre team. Both pilot groups provided great feedback for consideration for the broader BKI rollout. The Automotive Centre of Excellence (ACE), Foundations and Pathways, Health, Community teams and the Chief of Industry Engagement and Education Delivery Office data migration was also successfully completed on 19 September. The phased rollout will have minimal impact on work and will be implemented for all BKI portfolios (including the remaining Education Delivery teams) from October through to December this year.

Continuing our Self Assurance Journey


The BKI Self Assurance Survey was completed by 120 staff during August, responding to questions about participation, contribution, and continuous improvement practices in the organisation. The results confirm there is strong support, visibility, and engagement for self-assurance activities within BKI at a team level, whilst further work is required to improve at an institute level. We'll continue to work on this as part of the self-assurance program of work.

National Child Protection Week

Students and staff at our Broadmeadows, Bendigo city, and Charleston Road campuses got together to observe National Child Protection Week (NCPW) on Tuesday 6 September. Over morning tea our students heard from our CEO Sally Curtain via a video message acknowledging the week, and BKI's commitment to Child Safety. They also had the opportunity to socialise and network with peers over some games organised too. NCPW witnessed about 80+ youth conversing with the youth support team about the importance of child protection. The team engaged in educating and empowering the youth on the complexities of child abuse and neglect.

We are making significant progress with our Reconciliation Action Plan

With the new Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) chairs and RAP coordinator Candace Williams now on board, the RAP committee is making significant progress on our RAP deliverables. The committee will now meet every six weeks instead of every guarter to help in continuing with the critical dialogues to build stronger relationships, creating a safe and supportive environment for all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.



The committee met at Bendigo City on 10 August. Progress highlights shared by committee members included:

- Tiel Lillehagen shared the strategic alignment of our Health and Community Centre of Excellence (HACCOE) with the Reconciliation Action Plan. HACCOE has several relationships, opportunities, and governance initiatives in place to establish and maintain mutually beneficial relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander stakeholders and organisations, including staff and students, Wurundjeri, VAHS, aboriginal artists, Kinaway and Supply Nation.
- Andrew King discussed the progress and completion of RAP deliverables.

We've also incorporated a short session on RAP and its importance to our new starters (from August) through the virtual induction sessions. The first session was held on 9 August and was delivered by RAP Deputy Chair Priyanka Choudhury. We are also in the process of updating our Reconciliation Action Plan intranet site.


Wear It Purple Day acknowledgment and celebrations




We also observed RUOK Day in September across our campuses

Our Student Support team also hosted Morning Teas at Bendigo City, Richmond, Docklands, and Broadmeadows Campuses to observe RUOK Day from 5 to 10 September, to recognise and spread awareness of Suicide Prevention. There was a fantastic turnout of students and staff at campuses, with over 40 people participating at Richmond, over 80 people at Docklands, 200+ at Broadmeadows and around 100 at Bendigo City.

The Student Support team engaged in conversations about the importance of Mental Health, which resulted in referrals. There were a number of activities hosted by our Indigenous Education Centre, our Skills and Jobs Centre, Victoria Police Officers from Broadmeadows and Sunbury, Linkmate and the Hume Youth Centre, with some giveaways and a lot of fun and enjoyment.

The Bendigo City event also included English students' art displays. These students from Afghanistan, Karen State - Burma, and China are currently learning English with us. The art included words and activities to describe being OK such as friends, trust, talking, calm, resilience, playing sport, and meditating. VCAL students also for their resource tables - as part of their community subject they went out and met local community groups leading up to the event, bringing back resources to display for fellow students to use, as well as creating their own posters about RUOK dav.

The annual Victorian Training Awards brings together apprentices, trainees, students, teachers, training providers, employers and industry representatives, sharing in a high-quality training system that meets the needs of all Victorians. Winners of selected Victorian Training Awards categories will represent Victoria at the 2022 Australian Training Awards to be held in Adelaide, South Australia, on Friday 18 November 2022.

The visit was an important forum to exchange valuable insights into vocational education and skills pathways, as well as explore future collaborative opportunities. The visitors were provided with an exclusive tour of the Centre to learn more about our flexible, dynamic, and innovative pathways which offer learners unique opportunities to equip themselves with relevant skills and qualifications/degrees while learning and earning.

VTA Copyright audit achieves outstanding results

In August, we received outstanding results for our Copyright audit of BKI's teaching resources in MyLearning and in print form (via offsite printing requests). Externally audited by VTA from July to September last year for copyright and compliance purposes our results are great. External auditor Bill Kyrios provided great feedback, calling the results an exceptional outcome in terms of dollars and cents, and commented that BKI's processes are second to none. All Victorian TAFEs are a part of a copyright agreement that the Victorian TAFE Association has negotiated with the collecting society, Copyright Agency Ltd (known as CAL). This agreement requires BKI's teaching resources to undergo monitoring (auditing) every three years as per the agreement.

Auditor Bill Kyrios also noted that the impact of these processes lowered BKI's financial cost to the Statutory Text and Artistic Works Licence and showed a high level of adherence to the Copyright Act 1968. BKI has a Statutory Text and Artistic Works Licence which is controlled by the Copyright Agency Limited (CAL) that enables a 'reasonable portion' of works (print and electronic) to be copied or communicated for educational purposes without having to seek permission from the copyright owner. The auditor also noted that BKI showed the highest student engagement rate within a range of various delivery areas in a learning management system he has seen in

Quality Indicator Learner survey

Our annual Quality Indicator Learner survey opened on 2 August to hear from our students to help us understand how we can improve the student experience, key to achieving our strategic vision.

Showcasing the Bendigo TAFE experience at the VTA Conference

People Matter Survey

The People Matter Survey is a Victorian public sector employee opinion survey, seeking views on engagement, job satisfaction, career development, wellbeing, and inclusion. The insight from these results helps BKI improve the experience of staff and build a positive workplace culture. This year, 64 per cent of BKI staff had their say. The People Matter Survey is an important tool for us as it identifies what we are doing well and where efforts are needed to improve.

Key findings include that we love what we do, our work is meaningful, and we find it personally enriching. We feel safe to speak up and able to be ourselves. We feel more supported by our managers than other TAFEs and we are continuing to put our students at the centre of what we do. The organisation is focused on supporting our psychological health and wellbeing following a challenging few years.

Doing more with less with the Bendigo City Campus Revitalisation Project

On 12 September, Annie Tiso presented the Bendigo City Campus Revitalisation Project at the Tertiary Education Management Conference in Hobart. Annie's presentation was titled 'Doing more with less' and focused on what 'doing more' meant. Annie challenged the audience to think more broadly than budget when considering doing more and suggested this also should be expanded to thinking about how we can do more for the students and communities we serve and how we can reflect the voice of the traditional custodians of the land in everything we do. Annie also talked about lessons learned from this project and throughout her career and how she uses these lessons to anchor current and future projects.

A lesson in sustainable design from Queensland

Tiel Lillehagen and Annie Tiso visited Australia's first VET campus in Robina, Queensland, designed from the ground up to be sustainable in building, fit-out, procurement, curriculum, operations and culture. Like our Health and Community Centre of Excellence being designed for Broadmeadows, their building is rated 5-star. TAFE Queensland's General Manager on the Gold Coast, Karen Dickinson said "It is not enough for education to produce individuals with relevant industry skills and knowledge — it must be transformative and bring shared values to life and cultivate an active care for the world and for those with whom we share it. Courses delivered at the campus will not only skill the future workforce of the region but ultimately prepare students to be global citizens. Each course curriculum fosters environmental awareness in a way that links to everyday activities and ties in with the operational requirements of the campus." We now look forward to investigating more sustainability opportunities in collaborations with TAFE Queensland.
